



Montford Festival Parking Notice

The 15th Annual Montford Music & Arts Festival will be here before you know it! Saturday, May 19, to be exact.

The festival will follow the same set up as last year. We will close Montford Avenue from Chestnut to Wanetta. Soco will also be closed to traffic, but Soco residents can still park on the street. Cullowhee will be closed from Pearson to Cumberland Alley. The Ashville Fire Department will limit parking on Pearson Drive to one side of the street from Chestnut to Wanetta to allow for the rerouting of the buses. If you live in any of these areas, please note: There will be no parking on Montford from Chestnut to Wanetta and Cullowhee from Pearson to Cumberland Alley. Watch for the no parking signs on Pearson from Chestnut to Wanetta. We appreciate your cooperation. Thanks for pitching in and doing your share to make this a friendly and safe community event.





Chestnut Street Potholes

Answer Man: Will Chestnut Street potholes get fixed?

Question: I live at the intersection of Chestnut Street and Furman Avenue. Chestnut is a very busy and narrow artery. It runs between Harris Teeter and Trader Joe's, and it borders bed and breakfast inns, churches, homes and commercial buildings. Chestnut Street is very dangerous to the general public,

and to motor vehicles. It has a horrible amount of potholes, uneven pavement and unsuccessful attempts at pavement patches. Avoiding the potholes, parked cars and vehicles coming in the opposite direction, as well as crossing very busy intersecting streets, is like trying to manage a very difficult obstacle course. When will the city of Asheville pave Chestnut Street? Navigating Chestnut Street is like driving in a Third World country! Does the city have any other improvements planned for Chestnut Street?

My answer: Have you driven in a Third World country? Because their access to Trader Joe's is vastly superior to what we have here.

Real answer: As a frequent driver of Chestnut Street myself, I sympathize with this reader. It's a mess.

But let's move on to the city sources.

"The great news is that Chestnut Street is slated to be repaved this year," said city of Asheville spokeswoman Polly McDaniel. "Currently, Chestnut Street from Broadway to Montford Avenue is under contract to be paved, and the work is scheduled to begin this spring."

Further, a contract to repave Chestnut Street from Broadway to Charlotte Street is under review, she said.

"The work on that section is expected to happen this summer," McDaniel said. "In the meantime, the city is patching the potholes."


Asheville Streets Division Manager Chad Bandy said his department in recent weeks has "dispatched pothole repairs in many areas," including the Chestnut Street area.

"The freeze-thaw cycle has produced many potholes this time of the year," he said. "The city has an online app and responsive desktop/mobile site called the Asheville App where residents can report issues such as potholes, a tree down, things of that nature."

Colonel Sanders and The Age of the Motor Court

Located at 375 Weaverville Highway, Sander Court, was originally one of Asheville's first modern motels.

In the mid-1930's, automobile ownership was growing, roads were improving and people were embarking on road trips. Motor courts sprung up around the country along highways to meet travelers' needs. These provided lodging, parking, gas and home-style meals in attached diners.

"Colonel" Harlan Sanders, before the creation of Kentucky Fried Chicken, built his first motor court in Corbin Kentucky. Soon after,


he spotted a great location for his **second motor inn, just north of Asheville**. Originally, there were about 50 guest rooms.

The Asheville location was not quite as successful as the Corbin KY inn. There was more competition and the tourist trade was not year-round at that time. Rationing and war-time restrictions led to the Asheville inn's demise.

Colonel Sanders returned to Corbin to start his fried chicken business in earnest, and the property was taken over by Lee and

Helen Roberts. The court's central rooms were destroyed by a fire in 1956. They were rebuilt and then converted into apartments.

The Roberts sold the property in 1972. Since then it has changed hands several times. The lot configuration has changed over the years as well. At some point, a sign painter may have inadvertently left the "s" off the sign, so the name became Sander Court, as it is now.

I eventually acquired the property—transforming the rooms into furnished apartments.

For those of you who have lived here less than 15 years you would not remember that we had a police substation in Montford. In the 1990's a police team was located at 235 Montford Avenue. The neighborhood was fighting crime, drugs and prostitution. The police focus was on knowing the neighborhood. They were the PACT team: Police and Community Together. Neighbors would do ride along with officers on patrol and bake cookies for them. Volunteers would staff a desk in the front of the building soon to be the Nine Mile expansion. The officers participated in neighborhood events. They came dressed as bunnies for the Easter Egg hunt in Montford Park and we created a haunted house in the hallway of the station. We knew them, and they knew who lived in our community. One of the officers was Quentin Miller. During his time in Montford he received Officer of the Year and the Overall Regional Award for initiating a street ministry and midnight basketball program for at risk youth. He also led a job training program for unemployed community members and ran a summer camp for at risk youth for nearly a decade. Today he is running for Buncombe County Sheriff. As you make you decision about who to vote for in the election please note that one of the contenders knows Montford and Asheville.


