Thank you so much for participating in the Montford Holiday Tour of Homes. Your homes all looked beautiful, and we are grateful for your willingness to be on the Tour. We so appreciate all your hard work of preparation and especially your coping so graciously with the snow. I hope there was not too much clean-up involved.

For those who were not at the party last night, we grossed over \$16,000, of which \$9,600 was from sponsorships and ads, and \$5,600 was from ticket sales.

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

North Star Academy Work Day Lynn Raker

A big "Thank You" to Montford Neighborhood residents who helped with the front landscaping at Montford North Star Academy on November 17! The weather was perfect, as was the volunteer turnout from the neighborhood and the school. With outstanding teamwork, we were able to move a small mountain of topsoil, plant 32 shrubs and 72 native perennials, spread 300 cubic yards of mulch, fill about 30 bags of leaves and lay 54 stepping stones in just in 2½ hours, instead of the allotted 4 hours. The leaves were collected the next day and used by an Isaac Dickson School volunteer.

Participating in the landscaping project were 11 students and 10 adults from the school, a representative from the Asheville Roots Foundation and these Montford residents: Jan Crofford, Susan Eggerton, Vic Fahrer, Randy Hall, Dean Holt, Lesley Humphrey, Myo Koongnoo, Lynn Raker, Steve Raker, and Mark Voorhees.

Montford North Star Academy currently serves 6th and 7th graders as a STEAM (Science-Technology-Engineering-Art-Math) and project-focused learning environment. In 2019-2020, it will expand its curriculum to 6th-8th grades. The recent building renovation did not include a landscape plan, so it was fortunate the MNA could help with the installation of durable, shade-tolerant shrubs and ground cover to help soften the 1950's architecture.

The work on November 17 focused on the area between the mature maple trees and the building façade. The







open sunny "knoll" at the south end next to the driveway, which provides an excellent opportunity for additional colorful plantings, will be addressed with another workday in the spring. So, if you missed the November work day, please consider helping with Phase 2 this spring! Look for the announcement in a couple of months.

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Increased Montford Avenue Traffic Enforcement by Asheville Police

Lynn Raker (lynn.raker@gmail.com), Montford Neighborhood Association Board member, and Marc Voorhees (SlowDownMontford@gmail.com), Montford resident, met with Asheville Police Captain Gary Gudac (ggudac@ashevillenc.gov) on November 29th to discuss the results of the City's recent traffic study on Montford Avenue.

The results of the traffic study were shared in the November issue of the Montford Newsletter, but as a reminder, the traffic study showed speeds consistently in excess of the posted speed limit as well as a significant increase over the prior study in June 2014. More than 60% of the vehicles are now exceeding the posted speed limit of 30 mph. Approximately 260 vehicles per day are traveling in excess of 40 mph, with some of those traveling at 50, 60 and even 70 mph. Research shows that a pedestrian has a 50% chance of survival if struck at 30 mph, and only a 10% chance of survival if struck at 40 mph. This is clearly a dangerous situation given the amount of vehicular, pedestrian and bicyclist activity on Montford Avenue. Those drivers that speed on Montford Avenue are also likely to continue to do so as they move onto the side streets of Montford.

The Asheville Police Department has recognized this as an unsafe traffic environment, and as a result, has shifted significantly more police resources to Montford Avenue in terms of police patrol cars and radar traffic enforcement. The Asheville Police Department typically makes only about ~11 traffic stops in


an average month on Montford Avenue. However, with the recent increased APD focus, the number of traffic stops increased to ~55 stops in November, which is a 5X increase! With 260 vehicles per day speeding at >40 mph, that works out to about ~8000 vehicles per month traveling at >40 mph down Montford Avenue. So even at ~55 traffic stops per month, that is still stopping less than 1% of those >40 mph speeders. Clearly, APD has a daunting task to get the traffic situation safely under control. But APD has promised to maintain their recent increased presence for as long as they have available resources to do so. In addition to working with APD, we continue to work with the Asheville Department of Transportation to look at design changes to calm traffic on Montford Avenue and across Montford. We also continue to work to educate the community on the perils of speeding through this newsletter, bumper stickers, yard signs and discussion at MNA meetings.

We also discussed with Captain Gudac the potential of supplementing the APD presence with off-duty APD traffic enforcement patrols funded by the Montford Neighborhood Association. Unfortunately, APD is not able to support that request for several reasons. First, their off-duty program is aimed more at event control/visibility, not enforcement (eg, making arrests or writing tickets). And secondly, even if they were to focus on traffic enforcement, they lack the resources to do so. Only about half of their patrol cars have radar (radar is expensive to buy and maintain) and only some of the police officers are trained to use radar (radar training is expensive), so it would

be very/very unlikely that an offduty patrol car would even have the capability to enforce the speed limit. But for the foreseeable future, there will be an increased police presence on Montford Avenue. The

risk of getting a speeding ticket has significantly increased. The cost of a ticket including fees is around \$200. Pass the word to friends, neighbors,

renters, and visitors...please respect the safety of the community by driving at or below the posted speed limits in Montford...or suffer the legal/financial consequences.





Montford Reflections

Twenty-Three years ago the **Montford Holiday Tour of Homes** was known as the **Montford Culinary Tour of Homes**. Ticket sales were used to purchase supplies for the participating homes and to help support the APD substation—know as the Montford Resource Center located where Nine Mile is today.

The **Montford Culinary Tour of Homes** was mentioned in the third issue of our Newsletter. This brings up another subject, however. I have heard rumors of the existence of an earlier newsletter effort. Well, it's not a rumor. Sharon Fahrer told me that the North Carolina Room has scanned copies of this newsletter going back to 1987. This is very interesting, something to investigate after the Holidays!

Montford Resource Center or from participating homes on the tour. A map of the tour is printed on the back of the tickets. All proceeds from the tour will help operate and maintain the Montford Resource Center for the coming year.

Following is a bit of information about each home on the tour:

- * 97 Flint St. was built in 1898 as a two-story Queen Anne dwelling with simple details. Current owners Deborah Bryant, and Emily and Sunny Bryant Hutchinson, will serve hot, spirited apple cider and home-made egg nog.
- * 50 Cumberland Ave. dates back to around 1890. It originated as a one-story farm house before the area became a neighborhood. After Montford was established, Architect Richard Sharp Smith reportedly was responsible for adding a second story to the house in the early 1900s. Renovator Fred Eggerton received a Griffin Award for his work on the house. Current owners are Jim and Deena Knight. They will be serving coffee, tea, and homemade desserts.
- 64 Cumberland Ave.: When Architect David Hill purchased this 98year-old property in March 1995, it was a true monument to the bad things that had

happed to Montford over the years.

However, David — along with friends and relatives — are finishing renovation of the interior and beginning work on the exterior. David will be serving hors-d'oeuvres out of his newly remodeled kitchen.

- * 135 Cumberland Ave. was built in 1897 by O.D. Revell to resemble an English country cottage. This Queen Ann Victorian was recently converted into a bed and breakfast. Current owner Caroline Logie will offer tour guests a selection of heavy hors-d'oeuvres.
- * 46 Cumberland Circle is a Colonial Revival-style home built in 1908 by Architect Richard Sharp Smith for businessman D.L. Jackson. A Griffin-award winning renovation transformed it to its present use as the Abbington Green Bed & Breakfast in 1993. The home is owned by Valerie Larrea. A selection of holiday desserts will be served on the tour.
- * 61 Cumberland Circle was built around 1921 as a residence for Dr. John Donald MacRae and his wife. Caroline and Vann Boyd bought the house in 1994 and are in the process of restoring it to its original floorplan. A recent visitor to the house, Jane Garrigan, was Dr. MacRae's daughter. (See "I Remember When, page 3.) The Boyds will be serving specially prepared heavy hors-d'oeuvres.





