

Background information: The Final Environmental Impact Statement (FEIS) for the I-26 Connector Project was published on February 5. Pursuant to Section 106 of the National Historic Preservation Act, the Federal Highway Administration has determined that the project will have an "adverse effect" on Riverside Cemetery

within the Montford Area Historic District. This requires NCDOT to consider measures to avoid, minimize, and/or mitigate adverse effects to this historic property and include these measures in a Memorandum of Agreement (MOA), as part of the Record of Decision to be issued this summer... NCDOT has chosen the Design-Build route for this project, which allows some minor design changes to be proposed by the selected contractor; however, the contractor will be required to satisfy the conditions of the MOA. The project may be under contract as early as summer 2021.

Although the project proposes a significantly wider highway than currently exists between Riverside Drive and the entire western boundary of the Montford Neighborhood, only Riverside Cemetery is identified as having potentially adverse effects under the Section 106 statute. The proposed highway along the west boundary of Riverside Cemetery will be elevated and supported by a wall higher than 60 feet in places, creating negative visual impacts and view obstruction, and increased noise and pollution.

My neighbor Denise suggested that I write this month about insecticides, fungicides, etc that are harmful to pollinators after she witnessed someone spraying a pyrethroid based insecticide to rid their home of Box Elder bugs. Trust me, my wife would love it if I did the same since we've been dealing with them for months! That's for another column.

Denise's concern is justified since pollinators are responsible for well pollinating basically everything we eat that is plant-based and by extension any animal that is fed a plant-based diet.

How do you avoid purchasing pyrethroid based or other synthetic "cides"? Reading the labels is the best start and knowing what you're looking for definitely is helpful. Some other bad cides are:

- Organophosphates (e.g., acephate, chlorpyrifos, malathion)
- Carbamates (e.g., carbaryl)
- Neonicotinoids (e.g., imidacloprid)
- Pyrethroids (e.g., deltamethrin and cyfluthrin)

17th Annual Montford Music and Arts Festival to be Staged Saturday, May 30th.

The Montford Music & Arts Festival, the longest-running and only free-to-the-public festival in the greater Asheville area will stage its 17th annual event on Saturday, May 30, the first time the festival is being held after Memorial Day.

Presented by the Montford Neighborhood Association along tree-lined Montford Ave. in the historic Montford District, the event will run from 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. This year's festival was scheduled later in May to avoid conflict with the 50th Leaf Festival, which will be presented May 14-17 at Lake Eden this year.

"This annual event has been a great way for Montford residents to open their neighborhood to our friends in Asheville and remind all of us about the rich history of this historic district," said Dan Rogers, chairman of the Montford Music & Arts Festival Committee. "With free admission, everyone has access to our festival and can enjoy a day of live music, great food, artist displays, and fun activities while mingling with their neighbors."

Perhaps the most family-friendly street festival in western North Carolina, the Montford Music & Arts Festival features a special children's area for face painting, interactive displays, sidewalk chalk art contest, and other fun activities.

Located on Montford Ave. between Chestnut and Waneta Streets just down the street from downtown Asheville, the Asheville Visitors Center and Chamber of Commerce, the all-day event will also feature a music stage with another attractive lineup in 2020. Comprised solely of local musicians, the performing schedule will be announced shortly.

Attendees will also be treated to a wide variety of specialty cuisine, courtesy of food booths and food trucks. Also, more than 100 booth vendors will be on hand, with various artists, craftspeople and nursery plant purveyors selling their merchandise.

Music & Arts Festival

Featuring turn-of-the-century "Victorian" homes and several bed-and-breakfast inns, a portion of Montford is proclaimed a National Register Historic District. Many of today's Montford historic homes were designed by Richard Sharp Smith best known as supervising architect for the Biltmore House.

World-famous authors Thomas Wolfe and O. Henry are buried in Montford at the nearby Riverside Cemetery, while the community's rich history also dates back to the once-thriving African-American community of Stumptown, which ended in the 1960s.

The very first Montford festival was presented as strictly an arts event in 2004, held inside of Pyper's Place, which is now Nine Mile Restaurant, and Sweet Heaven Ice Cream Shop, now a real estate office.

How to prepare for the meeting: The public and other consulting parties are invited to share concerns and propose ideas for mitigation. NCDOT and SHPO will consider the proposals and resolve the alternatives into the final Memorandum of Agreement.

Only oral and non-electronic visual presentations will be allowed. No written documents will be accepted. It is critical for concerned members of the public to come prepared to share ideas succinctly and compellingly. Your testimony will ensure officials from NCDOT and SHPO fully understand how the enduring serenity and rich history of Riverside Cemetery is tacitly interwoven into the Asheville community.

While many of us share significant angst about the project, please note that the agenda is specific to impacts on Riverside Cemetery, and comments and discussion will be limited to this topic.





It's Important to Back Up Backup advice from OneClickFix

Businesses are losing huge amounts of data every day, purely because "backing up" is stuck at the bottom of their to-do list. What's the easiest, most effective way for your business to backup?

You've probably heard of file backup by a number of names: Cloud Sync, Cloud Backup or Cloud Storage. They're all similar enough to be confusing and meaningless enough to be anything. Here's what they mean and which one you need today.

Cloud Sync

Google Drive, Dropbox, iCloud, etc are services that sync up with a single folder on your computer. They mirror it. When a file changes in one, the sync service rushes to change it on your computer too, so they are always the same. Cloud Sync services are hugely flexible for remote employees, or even those squeezing in a few quick tasks while riding the train to work. They're ridiculously easy to use, require no training, and the free tiers are enough for most individuals. This all sounds amazing, right? Except...when things go wrong, they go wrong big time. Accidentally deleting a file means it disappears from the Cloud Sync drive – almost immediately. Overwriting a file does the same thing, and if an employee makes edits to the wrong file, then those edits are there to stay. If disaster strikes and your local copy becomes corrupted (or ransomed), well you guessed it, the corruption is uploaded too. Cloud Sync services are fantastic for productivity and accessing files on the go, but they simply can't be relied on as your backup tech.

Cloud Storage

Amazon S3, Microsoft Azure, etc are massive buildings full of storage drives that work just like your local hard drive, except you access them securely via the internet. In fact, when you use a cloud sync app like Dropbox, they're actually sending your data to one of these locations.

While the sync services have a constant back and forth connection between the storage center and your folder, and as explained above aren't good for backup, you have another option. You can access cloud storage on a per/GB basis yourself and upload your entire backup as desired. It won't update with changes on your local network, but it will be safe from disaster. When you need to retrieve a file, you simply login and download it.

Your backed up data is secure, protected against disaster, and always available to you. However, because it relies on you/your employee to handle the backup plan and manually take care of the uploads, this is a high-risk solution. We recommend an automated or outsourced solution so you can get on with business AND be protected.

Cloud Backup

Carbonite, Backblaze backup, Crashplan, etc might not be names you've heard before, but they work in the background to monitor changes to files on your computer or network and make sure you're backed up. You can roll back individual files or whole drives, and even select from earlier backups, not just one. Like sync services, they use cloud storage centers with extra-high security and redundancy so that your data is always there when you need it. Even better, neither you nor your employees need to worry about when it was last done.

Strategy

Let's take a moment to talk about planning. We recommend starting with the 3-2-1 strategy. This means having 3 copies in total, 2 of them locally such as on your computer and an external drive, and another offsite in the cloud. Using this strategy keeps your business operating when data disasters occur and is an investment in your uptime.
