

Community meeting minutes

July 27, 2022

Michael McDonough called the meeting to order at 6:35 pm at Archetype Brewing on Broadway Street. Approximately 50 neighbors were in attendance.

- Randy Hall detailed the strategic plan efforts and the four main components of the plan: Community Enhancement, Neighborhood Character & History, Recreation, and Trees & Natural Features.
- Lynn Raker detailed the tree grant option up to \$300 reimbursement for planting trees.
- Karen MacNeil detailed the invasives effort including the Raven Invasive management option. We will likely try to apply for CoA matching grant of up to \$5000.
 Montford would have to match with money, sweat equity, or in-kind donations. Meredith Stroud spoke on ECO (Bob Gale the principal) and Karen will reach out to speak with Bob. Leslie Mullen on Bearden had success with kudzu.
- APD Lt. Brian Griffin spoke. He is part of the community engagement division. He stated that many of the violent shootings in Asheville have been near housing units. APD is down 40% in staffing. He discussed the many homeless camps in Asheville,

especially on Cherry Street. Still no suspect yet on the assault on Pearson - vehicle was a gold Honda. Fires are an issue on South Montford Avenue and are likely caused by vagrants (Code enforcement is the driver for fires). If you see an issue, try to reduce anonymity by addressing the person but do not try to handle it by yourself. If you see someone pulling door handles on cars call the non emergency hotline at (828) 252-1110. Discussed speeding and stated that hard to patrol with staffing so reduced - Montford Avenue is likely bound for speed cushions - waiting on CoA emergency response from the new fire station on Broadway. Email concerns about homeless, etc. to apdcommunit...@ ashevillnc.gov.

- Seth Jackson detailed efforts at Tempie Avery Center. Contact him with any questions.
- MNA has nearly \$57K in the bank for activities. Part of the efforts with strategic planning is to smartly find ways to invest in our neighborhood.
- Susan presented her intention to approach HRC to modify guidelines about putting additions on one's residence. Asked for interest from others and their possible concerns for other guidelines.







The Montford Neighborhood Association will contribute up to 50% of your cost for planting a tree on your property - up to \$150 per tree and up to \$300 total per household.

Since September 2019, the MNA has helped fund 65 trees, awarded \$3,800 for tree planting, and leveraged over \$15,000 worth of tree planting projects. Any Montford property owner, renter, or local organization may apply. Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-serve basis. Award of grants is at the discretion and funding availability of the MNA.





Montford Park Players, an Asheville theatrical tradition, is proud to announce their upcoming production of the action/adventure/comedy The Three Musketeers. All performances will be held at the Hazel Robinson Amphitheatre at 92 Gay Street in the heart of Asheville's historic Montford District, from August 19th through September 17th on Friday, Saturday and Sunday evenings at 7:30pm. As he said, "I have loved this story, in almost all its versions, since I was a kid. The opportunity to bring my own vision of it to the stage ranks in the top three on my theatrical bucket list."

Smith continued, "We are looking to create a live-action summer blockbuster movie for the stage. Stunning, original costumes, huge set pieces filled with swordplay and dance, wrapped in an immersive soundtrack will take you out of your seat, and into the play."

Are you new to the neighborhood or has it been a long time since you last visited Pack Memorial Library in downtown Asheville? There are endless resources to explore or to discover:

- Over 150,000 items available for browsing and lending. These resources include books, periodicals, CDs, DVDs, and research materials. The library also participates in statewide resource sharing and offers inter-library loans.
- Free internet access, public computing, and Wi-Fi. Photocopy and printing services are available for a small fee.
- Free laptop and hotspot lending program. Laptops and hotspots are now available for a free 30 day loan with a library card.
- Free tickets to local attractions. Use your library card to sign up for Zoom passes, which are free tickets to local attractions like the WNC Nature Center, the NC Arboretum, or the Asheville Museum of Science.
- Free digital audiobooks, e-books, magazines, and movies. The Libby app from Overdrive provides downloads of these items to your smart phone, tablet, or computer. It's like an Audible subscription service, but free with your library card.

- A vibrant and inviting children's library. The library has books for all ages and reading levels, and board games, and sporting equipment available to lend.
- Thousands of unique local historical records, photographs, maps, and memorabilia. The Buncombe County Special Collections Library provides researchers the resources and expertise they need to understand and interpret the history of Western North Carolina.
- Bookends Used Bookstore offers bargain prices for a wide variety of books and media, including vintage and collectible materials and bestselling fiction. Proceeds from the sales benefit the library programming.

The two-second solution that keeps stuff safe and bears wild. Lock It or Lose It.



Have you seen news stories or videos featuring bears "breaking in" to homes and cars looking for food? What many stories don't mention is that much of the time the bear isn't breaking in. It's just following its nose to something that smells like food, cleverly opening an unlocked door or window and making itself at home.

Black bears have relatively short, curved claws (often under 2 inches) that are well adapted for climbing trees and tearing into rotten logs in search of insects. They're also well-suited for opening lever-style handles and sliding doors, unscrewing jar tops, opening coolers and picnic baskets and pushing up unlocked windows.



Easy In, Tough Getting Out

Our vehicles are often full of food, or stuff that smells like food. Unfortunately, vehicle doors can close on their own, trapping the



enterprising explorer inside. Bears don't have thumbs, so vehicle doors are much harder for a bear to open from the inside.

Black bears are strong enough to peel down a window that's open an inch or two and flexible enough that even large bears can crawl through an open window if they see or smell something interesting inside. Research shows that leaving your window cracked open only drops the temperature inside your vehicle by a degree or two, but makes it much easier for a bear to pop out the window to get inside.

Bears are very smart and very strong, and many trapped bears have no problem clawing their way out of the average vehicle. But fur coats are better at keeping bears hot than cool. When temperatures soar, the interior of a car can get hot enough to kill a trapped bear in a matter of minutes.

Even if the bear does manage to get out, many wildlife management agencies have firm policies that dictate that bears that enter homes and/or vehicles must be destroyed.

TIP: Many insurance policies do not cover wildlife damage to vehicles or homes.
