



The Montford Neighborhood Association will contribute up to 50% of your cost for planting a tree on your property - up to \$150 per tree and up to \$300 total per household.


Since September 2019, the MNA has helped fund 65 trees, awarded \$3,800 for tree planting, and leveraged over \$15,000 worth of tree planting projects. Any Montford property owner, renter, or local organization may apply. Applications will be processed on a first-come, first-serve basis. Award of grants is at the discretion and funding availability of the MNA.

Montford Crime Watch: Follow-up to September Newsletter

This is a follow-up to the September Montford Newsletter and has our most recent crime data, responses from our recent Montford Crime Survey and a list of the recommendations shared with the MNA Board. This is just a summary; more detail will be shared on ListServ.

The Data: Incidents thru Sept 30, 2022 (excl. Klondyke & Bulldog)


- Montford is relatively safe
- But Montford still averages two violent crimes per month (assaults or armed robbery)
- Violent crimes can occur anywhere in Montford; of the 19 thus far in 2022, 5 were on Cherry, 5 were on Cumberland, 2 on Montford and 1 on seven other streets
- Thefts are most likely to occur nearest to downtown (75% occurred south of Elizabeth Street)


The Survey: Community opinions on Montford crime were gathered via an electronic survey from September 12-25, 2022. The survey was shared via the Montford Newsletter, ListServ, NextDoor, Facebook...and residents were encouraged to share the survey with neighbors. These communication tools do not reach all Montford residents but were the only means available. The survey still gives a very good indication of how Montford feels on this subject.

217 people responded to the survey, with 84 offering comments


1- How concerned are you about the current level of crime in Montford?







Are you new to the neighborhood or has it been a long time since you last visited Pack Memorial Library in downtown Asheville? There are endless resources to explore or to discover:

- Over 150,000 items available for browsing and lending. These resources include books, periodicals, CDs, DVDs, and research materials. The library also participates in statewide resource sharing and offers inter-library loans.
- Free internet access, public computing, and Wi-Fi. Photocopy and printing services are available for a small fee.
- Free laptop and hotspot lending program. Laptops and hotspots are now available for a free 30 day loan with a library card.
- Free tickets to local attractions. Use your library card to sign up for Zoom passes, which are free tickets to local attractions like the WNC Nature Center, the NC Arboretum, or the Asheville Museum of Science.
- Free digital audiobooks, e-books, magazines, and movies. The Libby app from Overdrive provides downloads of these items to your smart phone, tablet, or computer. It's like an Audible subscription service, but free with your library card.

- A vibrant and inviting children's library. The library has books for all ages and reading levels, and board games, and sporting equipment available to lend.
- Thousands of unique local historical records, photographs, maps, and memorabilia. The Buncombe County Special Collections Library provides researchers the resources and expertise they need to understand and interpret the history of Western North Carolina.
- Bookends Used Bookstore offers bargain prices for a wide variety of books and media, including vintage and collectible materials and bestselling fiction. Proceeds from the sales benefit the library programming.

FEAST style Panzanella Salad

In FEAST cooking classes with kids we start with a framework of a recipe, then use what we have on hand and make substitutions. We try to teach them how to be creative when cooking with the ultimate goal of reducing food waste and



eating delicious fresh food. A traditional Panzanella salad is made with torn bread, tomatoes, basil, parmesan cheese and cannellini beans. At the Community Garden Network event (in true FEAST style) we didn't have a lot of these ingredients, so we made some delicious substitutions. Use this recipe as a framework and use some of the substitutions suggested below or make up your own!

Ingredients

6-8 cups torn bread (older bread is ideal for this)

1 cup finely chopped cheese (parmesan is traditional but any kind of cheese works)

2-3 cups chopped tomatoes (substitute roasted peppers, roasted carrots, roasted eggplant, cucumbers or squash)

2 cups fresh spinach leaves (substitute any leafy green)

1 cup fresh basil leaves (substitute ¼ cup oregano, thyme, cilantro, or chopped rosemary)

1 ½ cups cannellini beans (substitute any kind of bean or field pea) ¼ cup chopped olives, or onions (optional)

Italian style salad dressing or pesto dressing to taste

Pesto Salad Dressing

1/4 cup prepared pesto

¼ cup cider vinegar

⅓ cup extra virgin olive oil

1/4 teaspoon salt



Combine all salad ingredients in a large bowl. If making your own pesto dressing combine salad dressing ingredients in a jar and shake well. Drizzle about ½ cup dressing on salad and toss well. Taste and add more dressing if desired.



Green Corner Erin Hiatt

It is exciting to kick off my first Green Corner article! I am appreciative to Mitch and Ross for trusting me to take over the helm. While I have several ideas

In my job, I work on several intersectional areas of sustainability including environmental, but also diversity, equity & inclusion, and human rights. So while I plan to share plenty of practical "green" tips and updates, expect (and please suggest) insights on implications for these interconnected critical areas, too.

I thought I would use my first article to spotlight the information that got me nominated for taking the Green Corner over in the first place — tips on where to take hard to recycle items, originally shared via the Montford listserv.

Increased recycling and broader transitions to a more circular economy done right should ultimately reduce material, chemical, and emissions pollution while decreasing the burden landfilling and manufacturing and processing facilities (including recycling) have on underserved communities globally.

First, adhering to Asheville's blue bin curbside guidelines is key. Aspirational recycling (sometimes called "wishcycling") is when we put items in the curbside bin when we are not sure or wish they were curbside recyclable, and it causes a lot of issues. The city's website (https://www.ashevillenc.gov/service/what-can-i-recycle/) and Waste Wizard tool are great to navigate the dos and don'ts, but there are supplemental recycling options.

One resource linked to on the city resource pages are the amazing quarterly Hard2Recycle events (https://hard2recycle.org/dates-items/) organized by Asheville GreenWorks for items like books, electronics, cables/computer peripheries, styrofoam, Brita filters/packaging, personal care and beauty items, plastic cutlery, writing instruments, and other items.

Various big brand and local businesses also offer recycling for items like thin plastic films, contact lenses and packaging, textiles, batteries, electronics/accessories, light bulbs, car seats, and more. Terracyle https://www.terracycle.com, the company through which some of these drop-offs recycle items, has a number of free mail-in programs sponsored by brands or home collection boxes that can be purchased.

This does not even include product reuse/resale options - or all the amazing bulk/refill options we have in the area to reduce waste in the first place that I would be glad to explore in future articles.

I hope you learned something new! Take it one step at a time to do better once you know better. Until next time.
