#### **Removing Kudzu** Karen MacNeil

Workshop Abstract: Kudzu Culture is a 501(c)(3) nonprofit that reconnects people with kudzu while growing a regenerative kudzu economy in the Southeastern United States. Kudzu Culture partners with stakeholders like Urban Forest Alliance to host educational, hands-on workshops that teach community members how to responsibly and effectively interact with kudzu. The kudzu growth existing along the Reed Creek Greenway and adjacent treeline negatively affects native species and must be eradicated. The goal of Kudzu Culture, Urban Forest Alliance, MNA, and other stakeholders is to strategically remove sections of kudzu growth through a multi pronged approach that includes private contracted removal and ongoing community hands-on removal occurring during seasonal workshops. Community removal, facilitated through Kudzu Culture workshops, circulates removed biomass into crafts and products like baskets, wreaths, paper, wovens, and non-woven materials. Biomass will also be processed into fertilizer and mulch that can be fed back into the site.

#### Winter: "Weaving Birdhouses from Kudzu Vines"

March 5, 1-4pm (part of Invasive Awareness Week)

Learn to identify kudzu vines when the leaves are dormant; Harvest old-growth vines and runner vines for bird houses, basketry, woven fencing, and wreath making; Hot kudzu root tea samples will be served.

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#### Spring: "Ephemerals in the Kudzu" April 29, 10am-1pm

Learn to identify young kudzu growth shoots; Harvest shoots; Identify and mark clusters of native ephemeral species emerging in kudzu growth; Pickled kudzu shoot snack samples will be served.

#### Summer: "Kudzu Blossom Harvest" August 5, 10am-1pm

Learn to identify kudzu blossoms and how to prevent seed pod development; Harvest kudzu blossoms; Kudzu blossom drink samples will be served.

#### Fall: "Making the Mulch of Kudzu"

#### November 5, 1-4pm

Learn how to "chop and drop" kudzu to make mulch, compost tea, and other materials for farming and gardening; Hot kudzu root tea samples will be served.

This month, let's continue to explore how to live more sustainably when it comes to the life cycle of our stuff. We have previously discussed recycling



(October), refill (November), and resale & refurbished (December & January).

This edition, reuse – specifically the so-called sharing economy. The environmental impact of our stuff can be greatly reduced simply if it gets used more often before it gets tossed (or hopefully, repurposed or recycled). This is because opportunities to share or rent mean that instead of everyone owning their own item and each item having its own environmental footprint, one item can serve the needs of many people.

If you've borrowed a truck from a friend or family member; checked out a book from the library; or rented a venue or supplies for an event, you're being more sustainable just by acting on situations where buying or owning something outright doesn't make sense, for whatever reason. Even if your primary "why" is financial, lack of space/avoiding clutter, etc., you're also making a greener choice.

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#### Montford Neighborhood Association

#### Community Meeting January 25, 2023

President Michael McDonough called the meeting to order at 6:37pm.

- APD Community Resource Officer (CRO) Carrie Lee provided some insight on the current APD structure. There are only 2 CRO and staffing remains down 40% overall. The future looks brighter as they are training more recruits than attrition is taking away officers. Her contact information is clee@ashevillenc.gov and the non emergency number is (828) 252-1110. She will provide a direct phone number to Michael to share with Montford. She indicated that the new substation on Broadway should be operational sometime in May. She was asked about neighborhoods that have good interaction with APD and she indicated that Shiloh has a good community watch.
- Financial update. Currently have \$55,400 in the bank. No income producing events have occurred lately due to Covid. The 2023 budget is predicting a deficit for the year. We have about \$10K in fixed costs annually.
- Ellen Nutter detailed the changes to the bylaws; the first modification since 2009. The three tenets of the modifications are: Preserve historic character of Montford, Neighborhood communication and community engagement, and engage with outside groups like City of Asheville, etc. A motion to adopt the modifications was made by Bill Eakins and seconded by Marti Boyles. No discussion and the vote was unanimous to adopt the amended by laws.
- Board nominations were discussed. Three current board members are departing due to the new term limit contained in the new by laws. The proposed slate is as follows: Leslie Humphrey President; Randy Hall Vice President; Susan Eggerton Treasurer, Dan Rogers Secretary. Current board members Lynn Raker and Karen MacNeil will remain as at large and the suggested new at large board members will be Bill Eakins, Marti Boyles and Tom Fahsenfeld. If others feel strongly about nominating additional folks, please contact the current board by March 1 for consideration.
- Kudzu removal project was discussed. We are working with Raven Technologies and the upcoming workshop is scheduled for February 26 on the Reed Creek Greenway as part of Invasive Species Awareness Week. The publicity kit is

forthcoming. Thanks to Karen MacNeil for all her hard work in obtaining the matching grant from the City of Asheville.

- Solar in Montford was discussed by Susan Loftis. There will be a forum on April 12 in the Lenoir Rhyne boardroom beginning at 6:30pm for approximately two hours. The focus is on four arenas of conservation. Bring your questions for the expert panel.
- The Montford Garden Tour is scheduled for June 3, 2023, from 10:00am til 4pm. Lynn Raker is chairing the tour. Tickets should be on sale by May 1 at the latest.
- Lynn also advocated the tree grant program. A homeowner may receive up to \$300 in reimbursement for planting trees. Do make sure you obtain approval prior to purchase and planting.
- Crime was discussed by Leslie Humphrey. Marc Voorhees did extensive work on scrubbing numbers on crime. He posted his survey on impressions and possible actions to take via the Listserv. The MNA Board consensus was that off duty APD officers was not an efficient use of funds due to the lack of measurable results of such an effort. Neighborhood watch would be ideal but we need a champion to lead the effort.
- Ellen Nutter detailed the Montford Lights which was held on December 9, 2022 and had great attendance. The afternoon began with a performance at HRA, marching band to the Montford Garden, tree lighting, and an enthusiastic ensemble playing along with Christmas carols.
- Ellen also detailed the Reed Creek Greenway efforts. Currently the greenwas goes from Elizabeth Street to the WT Weaver Blvd. Plans are to go South to Ashton Park and North to the French Broad River. The committee will hire a consultant to recommend routes, both North and South.
- Leslie Humphrey will work with Dan Sanford to modify our communication. Listserv only reaches a percentage of neighbors and these two will brainstorm to establish an improved system. Please consider saying yes if they reach out to you to volunteer.
