
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

Gift Giving

In past editions, we've naturally touched on many of the practices

and characteristics you can leverage when gift-giving, to both minimize negative and maximize positive impacts when voting with your dollar. You might shop local at one of the many delightful makers markets around, buy second hand, and/or look for certified environmental or social impact credentials.

Inspired in part by the "Happier Holidays: How to Give and Receive the Perfect Gift" episode of The Happiness Lab Podcast about the psychology of gift giving in general, here are a few other considerations to keep in mind:

- Avoid knick-knacks and purely novelty gifts. Ask yourself: is this something they will be glad to have a week from now? If not, save them the clutter and avoid contributing to the demand for cheap items that will inevitably end up in the trash. If you need stocking stuffers, consider treats or recyclable items over plastic tchotchkes.
- **Get them what they want.** If you know what someone wants, don't risk missing the mark unwanted physical gifts not only mean faked enthusiasm but they can have a big environmental footprint whether the recipient throws it away or if it's too risky or challenging to resell once returned to a retailer. If the lack of surprise makes it seem less special, build a different emotional connection. For example, if gift cards feel uninspired, you can ask them to tell you about what they end up spending it on and why.
- **Gift experiences.** The joy we get from a gift can be multiplied if it builds excitement from anticipation of a future event and helps build new memories.

Gift Wrapping

- **Consider reusable gift wrapping.** The "wrapping" could be part of the gift itself or just a great gift bag that can be reused for years to come.
- **Minimize plastic tape.** Building recyclable origami gift boxes or learning tapeless or furoshiki wrapping techniques can be its own holiday activity.
- Opt for recyclable or compostable ribbon and tags over plastic.
- Ensure your wrapping paper/bags are actually recyclable. Most wrapping paper and many bags can't be recycled, so if you do use glossy or glittery varieties, make sure it ends up in the trash.

And as we approach the end of the year, if living more sustainably will be one of your New Year's resolutions, take it one step at a time! Building new habits and routines is challenging and the science shows being compassionate with yourself when you do new, hard things is the best way to avoid giving up.

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





Pack Memorial Library 67 Haywood Street in downtown Asheville

Are you new to the neighborhood or has it been a long time since you last visited Pack Memorial Library in downtown Asheville? There are endless resources to explore or to discover:

- Over 150,000 items available for browsing and lending. These resources include books, periodicals, CDs, DVDs, and research materials. The library also participates in statewide resource sharing and offers inter-library loans.
- Free internet access, public computing, and Wi-Fi. Photocopy and printing services are available for a small fee.
- Free laptop and hotspot lending program. Laptops and hotspots are now available for a free 30 day loan with a library card.
- Free tickets to local attractions. Use your library card to sign up for Zoom passes, which are free tickets to local attractions like the WNC Nature Center, the NC Arboretum, or the Asheville Museum of Science.
- Free digital audiobooks, e-books, magazines, and movies. The Libby app from Overdrive provides downloads of these items to your smart phone, tablet, or computer. It's like an Audible subscription service, but free with your library card.

• A vibrant and inviting children's library.

The library has books for all ages and reading levels, and board games, and sporting equipment available to lend.

 Thousands of unique local historical records, photographs, maps, and memorabilia.

The Buncombe County Special Collections Library provides researchers the resources and expertise they need to understand and interpret the history of Western North Carolina.



• Bookends Used Bookstore offers bargain prices for a wide variety of books and media, including vintage and collectible materials and bestselling fiction. Proceeds from the sales benefit the library programming.


