

# **78 Flint Street**

This is new house, a Griffin award winner in 2015, owned by Andrea Vahti and Jody Kuhne. Jody grew up in Asheville, moved away, and returned as an adult. He has restored several houses in Montford, including their previous home on Starnes Avenue, which was on the Montford tour a few years ago. The property at 78 Flint adjoins their previous property on Starnes.



# **175 West Chestnut Street**

You have to see the transformation of this home that went up for auction a couple of years ago. It had been sitting vacant except for vagrants, for years. The neighbor who lived across the street bid highest. He renovated the house, afterward commenting, "With our second son less than a year old and a business to run, it was the dumbest and most difficult thing I've ever done. . . but now I can say rewarding. Would I do it again? Hell no." This single-family home, built in 1925, has 3 bedrooms, 1 bath, and 1,171 square feet. It sits on a 3,920 square foot lot.

# Abbington Green B&B, 46 Cumberland Circle – Refreshment Stop

Built by D.L. Jackson, the home became known as the Wythe Peyton House and was the residence of Wythe and Flora B Peyton. Mr. Peyton was a district engineer for the State Highway Commission and later served as Asheville's Postmaster. Designed originally by Richard Sharp Smith, its 1993 Griffin Award-winning renovation transformed it from a group rental property into this thriving B&B. Brimming with holiday décor, it is a perfect stop to enjoy refreshments and entertainment.



52 Cumberland Circle

This is a beautifully remodeled single-family Arts & Crafts home with lots of charm. Classic details like period light fixtures, beautiful molding, great foyer, and large covered front porch blend well with an updated kitchen and bathrooms. The home is striking for the amount of natural light in its interior, with 3 bedrooms and 2 1/2 baths.

# **149 Flint Street**

This single-family home, built in 1924, is one of the two on this year's Tour that is for sale. It's a 3-bedroom, 2-bath, 2-story Craftsman-style home. The lot is 6,969 square feet.



The Gudger House, 89 Montford Avenue

This is truly great example of how a run-down house can be brought back to life. Henry Lamar Gudger, the Asheville postmaster, purchased this property at the gateway to the Montford District in 1890. In 1895, Gudger constructed a rambling classic Queen Anne Victorian frame house with gables and towers. This ornamental variation has sometimes been called "Steamboat Gothic." The home remained in the Gudger family until the 1950s, then fell into disrepair and was condemned (see page 15). In 1978 the home was acquired by the Preservation Society of Asheville and Buncombe County, was restored, and then sold to Pisgah Legal Services with covenants to the property protecting its future and its historic presence in our neighborhood. In 2014 The Ehrmann Law Group purchased the home, and after another extensive renovation, gave new life to this Montford treasure as their offices.



# **47 Short Street**

This single-family home was built this year. It's a 2,772 square foot interior with a partially finished basement, on a 4,792 square foot lot. Back and front porches, and interior wooden, cork, and tile floors.



# **37 West Chestnut**

This new addition to Montford was constructed by Jade Mountain Builders and features industrial modern interior with four stories. Cedar shake, stucco, and brick exterior. The chimney and front entry were built by a local brick artisan. Spacious, open floor plan with master on main and finished garage/studio/bike room. The home features black walnut cabinetry, tulip poplar accent walls, white oak floors, and open stairwell with ash stair treads and custom metal work. It has five bedrooms plus a finished attic, 4.5 baths, and a one-car garage. It is currently for sale. 3

# **Mystery Houses Discovered**

Last month's newsletter, the November issue page 7, showed two houses Zoe Rhine and her colleagues in the North Carolina Room, Pack Library, thought might be in Montford, but weren't sure. Several keen neighbors emailed me to let me know they'd spotted these "mystery houses." Thanks to Colleen Webster, the Backers, Jody Kuhne, and a few other neighbors for writing.

Mystery House #1 is the bright blue house at 311 Montford Avenue. House #2 is 37 Watauga, owned by Derek and Jennifer Backer. Jennifer was kind enough to send this description:

We call our home The Bernard-Glenn house. It was designed by local architect Richard Sharp Smith for Alfred S. Bernard (Mayor of Asheville) in 1905. The home was finished in 1906. The home was later sold to Eugene Byron Glenn, a prominent physician noted for his work with tuberculosis. He was also friends with Thomas Wolfe and was the inspiration for Wolfe's character, Dr. Hugh McGuire.

# How to Find Your Cat

You've taken great care of your cat, kept her inside, loved that inscrutable fur ball to the max. But one day, it happens. One day, a window was left open, there was a hole in the screen, a door stayed open a nanosecond too long and boom, out goes Muffin Toes,



whose only world has always been the security of your home. It's horrible. Your cat's gone missing. What's your cat going to do but more importantly, *what are you going to do?* 

Judging from the number of sad, utility pole-posted signs in Montford, this happens more often than you would like to think. But, wait a minute. We live on the information highway, right? The world's at our fingertips. You wonder — could there be some collective wisdom, a click away? Well, guess what? There is, and here's some of the best advice:

**Act quickly**. First, make sure your cat's not just simply hiding in the house. If not, contact your neighbors, ask them to look out. Recently, my own cat Tilson (aka Criminal) slipped out but a quick-thinking neighbor let me know she had seen him heading toward Westover. Roped him in. Organize a search party in your immediate area, assigning search areas to different people. Leave a door open. Your cat might just come back in. Leave an object (a favorite cat blanket, bed, toy, etc.) on the porch to help your cat identify the correct house by smell.

**Organize a new search party between 5 and 8 pm**. Cats hunt at night, dislike noise, and are more apt to come out when all quiets down. Take a flashlight – your cat's eyes will reflect in the beam, making it very visible. Have you ever associated sounds with feeding? I always tap on glass bowls with a knife. My cats come to that sound. Is there any other sound the cat responds to, a cat toy, perhaps? If so, use it.

**Publicize your search**. If your cat is gone for more than a few hours, hang posters that include a color picture of your cat and its name, your name, the date and location it disappeared from, a phone number and an email address.

**Use the power of the internet**. Cats usually stay in the area where they live but can occasionally travel further. Use Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and, of course, our own Montford Listserv to spread the word.

**Offer a reward**. This might encourage people to look for your cat actively.

**Contact animal charities**. Your cat might have been found and taken to a shelter. Call local veterinarians. They might have your animal, too.

**When you find your cat**. Be careful. Your cat might be afraid or wounded. Look for potential escape routes and try to anticipate its movements. Approach slowly and, if possible, offer food. Let the cat sniff your hand and give it time to realize it's you. Gently take the animal in your arms.

**Take your cat to the vet**. If your cat was out for a few days, you might consider heading to the vet. Injuries, such as rib fractures, are not always easy to spot. And, your cat might have picked up a skin disease or fleas.


# Brown Paper Bags Dressed to the Nines

The Montford Neighborhood Association held its regularly scheduled monthly meeting Tuesday, October 20, 2015 at 7pm at the Montford Community Center on Pearson Drive. In attendance were MNA Board members Brian Elston, President, Michael McDonough, Vice President, David Patterson, Secretary, and at-large board members Ellen Nutter, Joan Miller, Ross Terry, and Leslie Humphrey. Also in attendance were Asheville Police CRO Sean Davis and APD District Commander Lt. Gary Gudac. Various neighbors were also in attendance.

Brian Elston, President, called the meeting to order at 7pm.

# Safety and Security

Asheville Police Officer Davis gave an update on police matters in Montford. Of note were the attempted robbery on Pearson Drive and a stolen vehicle (also on Pearson). Officer Davis reported that there was a good turnout for trick-or-treaters on Halloween. Residents asked that police start more rigorous enforcement of parking at the Montford Convenience Store.

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# **Treasurer's Report**

Susan Eggerton, Treasurer (not in attendance) provided a financial report showing current MNA expenses and an account balance. There was also a brief discussion regarding difficulty in obtaining liability insurance for the proposed Waneta Garden Space as required by the City. Suggestions for spending ideas were also requested.
