Historic Montford's June 7 Garden Tour

Features Great Gardens for a Cause

Less than a year after Hurricane Helene the Montford Neighborhood Association will celebrate Asheville's resilience by hosting its biennial garden stroll to raise funds for community improvements. The 2025 Historic Montford Garden Tour takes place Saturday, June 7, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., rain or shine.

Tickets are \$30 each and are available online at www.montford.org/garden/ tour/ or in person at the Asheville Visitors Center gift shop, 36 Montford Ave., with cash or check. Tickets will be available through the website April 15 – June 6.

In years past the neighborhood after Hurricane Helene is a high priority among residents. The 2025 garden tour will feature live music and plein air artists at each of the eight gardens to make the

tour a uniquely Montford affair. And new this year, an information fair at Montford Garden will be a great opportunity to connect with native plant specialists and learn more about local garden venues.

> Are you wanting to install a pollinator garden and/or a meadow in your newly sunny yard?


Are you needing advice on how to re-invigorate, prune or replace your plants and trees?



The Latest Dirt

News from the Asheville Botanical Garden

Welcome to the Latest Dirt update! The Asheville Botanical Garden is now fully open for the season! The trails are still showing evidence of Hurricane Helene, but



the dangerous trees and hanging branches are almost gone. The garden will be closed for what we hope is the final cleanup on March 24 and April 1 (no foolin'!) The visitor's center and the Garden Path Gift Shop are open 10-4, and the shop is fully stocked with the usual interesting items. We hope, if you have an Easter basket to fill for some lucky youngster or adult, you'll stop in and check out our suggestions.

You will notice a lot of renovation activity happening. The glass "greenhouse" on the front of the building has been removed, and there are plans afoot to add a patio with tables and chairs for resting after your stroll through the garden. You'll also see the railings along the front steps are in the process of replacement with some decorative but sturdier ironwork, courtesy of Iron Maidens, a team of women metal workers! Our community space, the Butler Room, has been fully renovated complete with an up-to-date audio/visual system.

With the loss of 45 old shade trees, the garden itself will be adding new plantings, some designed for our unexpected additional sun and others for streambank reparation. If you have lost any trees at home, you may get some helpful ideas for your property . Of particular interest might be the layered, multi-species native evergreen shrub border planned along Broadway. It will provide a great "privacy fence" to distract from the traffic noise while offering a home for our bird population. Fences make for good neighbors, but they don't necessarily have to be wood or metal!

Speaking of birds, the Bird Garden, located between our two major bridges, will be completely redesigned. With so many nesting sites destroyed, we plan to optimize the bird-watching experience for our guests! Landscaping for wildlife habitat is a guiding principle for ABG. Bird nerds are invited to join Dr. Andrew Laughlin on March 30, 8:30 - 10 am for a Spring Bird Walk. ABCRC: BUILDING GOOD COMMUNITY RELATIONS

he main purpose of the Asheville/Buncombe Community Relations Council (ABCRC) is to handle discrimination problems relating to housing and employment. However, as Director Bob Smith will tell you, ABCRC is much more than that.

"We're about people working it out and communicating, and about feeling good about your community," he says. Smith has been the director for the past 12 years and oversees a staff of four. There are trained investigators at ABCRC who delve into a variety of issues. If someone is not being treated fairly by a landlord or was fired for an unknown reason, ABCRC will check into it.

ABCRC is funded by the City and the County. Overseeing the Council is a board of about 20 people from the City, the County, and the Chamber of Commerce.

Some of ABCRC's most noteworthy programs directly involve communities:

- Annual Essay and Poster Contest, which is open to young people throughout the County. Children express their views concerning brotherhood in writing, or visually. The winning essay or poster becomes ABCRC's theme for the year.
- Woman of the Year, which recognizes an outstanding citizen of Buncombe County.
- Fair Housing Program, which draws national speakers to address issues of fair housing.

Smith lives in Montford on Tacoma St. and says that this neighborhood "is a fine example of what (ABCRC) would like the whole community to be like." He adds:

"Montford is the most diverse neighborhood in the county. There are low-income families living next to moderately wealthy families. There are black, white, Hispanic, and Asian people getting along. You're always seeing people talking on porches and kids playing together. There are good human relations happening here, and Montford is a very special area to us."

Since ABCRC also offers trained mediators, Smith says he would like to see this service utilized when such issues arise as the one involving the Montford store and sales of alcohol. "We're here to help neighbors work it out."
