Welcome & Introductions

President Randy Hall welcomed approximately 20 neighbors to our quarterly meeting

APO Community Resource Officer - Officer Isaiah Senyak

Officer Senyak reported that since our last meeting, in the Montford neighborhood, there have been:

one incident of vandalism and the suspect was arrested one attempted breaking and entering and the investigation is ongoing

- larcenies
- 3 car thefts (one vehicle unlocked, two vehicles unlocked with keys left in)

- 2 incidents of fraud
- one suspicious person located and charged with drug paraphernalia
- 2 driving while intoxicated
- one civil disturbance resulting in an arrest and seizure of narcotics
- 9 larcenies from a motor vehicle
- 41 traffic stops
- 27 separate instances of crime prevention
- one subject who was stalking women has been arrested and charged with stalking

He reminded everyone to keep their vehicles locked—most of the larcenies from motor vehicles were from cars that were unlocked.

We can keep up with incidents by viewing the www. communitycrimemap.com, or by signing up at www. ashevillenc.gov/service/sign-up-for-avl-alert/. Also, you can report homeless encampments in the Asheville app.

Capt. John Brown discussed the upcoming Citizens Police Academy. It is a 10 week program to educate people about how the APD works, applications close down 8/28. Classes are scheduled for one evening per week, September 18 continued next page

Neighborhood Services Specialist Trey Irby

The Asheville Planning & Zoning Commission has a vacancy. Trey invited Montford residents to apply and have a voice on the development of the city. More information can be found at this link: https://www.ashevillenc.gov/department/city-clerk/boards-and-commissions/

Elevate AVL is a project of the City to promote and encourage sustainability and climate justice. Trey invited neighbors to check it out. The website includes a link for a Climate Action Toolkit.

The City has also opened applications for its Neighborhood Matching Grants Program (NMG). This program helps Asheville's neighborhood-based organizations fund various improvement projects by providing a dollar-for-dollar matching grant of up to \$5,000. The program is designed to strengthen relationships between neighbors, cultivate the spirit of volunteerism, and create projects for the benefit of their communities. There will be workshops about the program. Neighborhoods can only receive one grant at a time. The city has \$60,000 available.

A neighbor brought up the problem of junk vehicles that

have been parked at the corner of Flint and Elizabeth St. for several years. Trey was familiar with the problem. He said the delay in getting them removed was due to uncertain ownership of the house and vehicles. He will follow up to see what can be done.

Electrify Asheville-Buncombe

Emily Hurd presented information about Electrify Asheville-Buncombe. This is a local program\ partnering with Clean Energy NC that started in 2024. Its goal is to assist Asheville and Buncombe County in convert to 100% renewable fuel by 2042. Their focus is on helping residents, businesses, and institutions replace all fossil fuel powered equipment and appliances with electric powered ones.

They offer a free consultation service about converting to electric equipment, available rebates, connections to reliable local contractors, and affordable financing options. They offer inclusive financing for clean energy upgrades, More information can be found at www. letsgoelectric.com

and the City of Asheville helped with a neighborhood grant. This year, we are planning to limit the growth of kudzu, the primary invasive, by planting shade trees. This is made possible by the profit earned on our garden tour.

We have also made an agreement this year with Holy Trinity Greek Orthodox Church to work on property they own that abuts the greenway. Invasive plants do not respect property lines!

The team that has been leading this effort encourages everyone to show up for the work days. Announcements are made on the Montford Listsery.

Garden Tour Results — Lynn Raker

The garden tour was very successful with more than \$24,000 in earnings. This included \$10,000 in sponsorships.

We are very interested in having people volunteer their gardens for our next garden tour in 2027.

We will have our Holiday Tour of Homes the second Saturday after Thanksgiving, which is December 6th.

Community Space Uplift and FEMA – Susan Loftis

Thanks to a grant from the City of Asheville's Community Space Uplift program, Odyssey School will be receiving enhanced audio-visual equipment in September. This will allow the Montford Neighborhood Association and other community groups to broadcast community meetings on the Internet for those who cannot attend in person.

There is still one FEMA office open in Asheville handling claims from Hurricane Helene storm damage. It is located on Cox Ave right across from the post office. Those who wish to discuss claims are advised that It is best to just walk into the office.

Stumptown Update - Karen MacNeil

Stumptown was a thriving community of Black residents that was located in the area now occupied by the Tempie Avery Community Center. Its development was started in the 1880s. The neighborhood was redlined in the 1930s, eliminating investment in the community, and it was later devastated by "urban renewal." Karen MacNeil continued next page




New Moon - Music in the Park (Weather permitting)

Are you new to the neighborhood or has it been a long time since you last visited Pack Memorial Library in downtown Asheville? There are endless resources to explore or to discover:

- Over 150,000 items available for browsing and lending. These resources include books, periodicals, CDs, DVDs, and research materials. The library also participates in statewide resource sharing and offers inter-library loans.
- Free internet access, public computing, and
 Wi-Fi. Photocopy and printing services are available for a small fee.
- Free laptop and hotspot lending program. Laptops and hotspots are now available for a free 30 day loan with a library card.
- Free tickets to local attractions. Use your library card to sign up for Zoom passes, which are free tickets to local attractions like the WNC Nature Center, the NC Arboretum, or the Asheville Museum of Science.
- Free digital audiobooks, e-books, magazines, and movies. The Libby app from Overdrive provides downloads of these items to your smart phone, tablet, or computer. It's like an Audible subscription service, but free with your library card.

- A vibrant and inviting children's library. The library has books for all ages and reading levels, and board games, and sporting equipment available to lend.
- Thousands of unique local historical records, photographs, maps, and memorabilia. The Buncombe County Special Collections Library provides researchers the resources and expertise they need to understand and interpret the history of Western North Carolina.
- Bookends Used Bookstore offers bargain prices for a wide variety of books and media, including vintage and collectible materials and bestselling fiction. Proceeds from the sales benefit the library programming.

Six At-Home BearWise Basics



Never Feed or Approach Bears

Intentionally feeding bears or allowing them to find anything that smells or tastes like food teaches bears to approach homes and people looking for more. Bears will defend themselves if a person gets too close, so don't risk your safety and theirs!



Secure Food, Garbage and Recycling

Food and food odors attract bears, so don't reward them with easily available food, liquids or garbage.



Remove Bird Feeders When Bears Are Active

Birdseed and grains have lots of calories, so they're very attractive to bears. Removing feeders is the best way to avoid creating conflicts with bears.



Never Leave Pet Food Outdoors

Feed pets indoors when possible. If you must feed pets outside, feed in single portions and remove food and bowls after feeding. Store pet food where bears can't see or smell it.



Clean & Store Grills

Clean grills after each use and make sure that all grease, fat and food particles are removed. Store clean grills and smokers in a secure area that keeps bears out.



Alert Neighbors to Bear Activity

See bears in the area or evidence of bear activity? Tell your neighbors and share information on how to avoid bear conflicts. Bears have adapted to living near people; now it's up to us to adapt to living near bears.





Blackberry Cobbler

This blackberry cobbler has a light and fluffy cake-like topping instead of the traditional biscuit-style. My fiancé said this blackberry cobbler was the best she's ever had. Serve warm with heavy or whipped cream.



Prep Time: 15 mins Cook Time: 55 mins Total Time: 1 hr 10 mins

Servings: 10

Yield: 1 9x13-inch cobbler

Ingredients

Berries:

- ½ cup white sugar
- 2 tablespoons cornstarch
- 6 cups fresh blackberries
- ¼ cup unsalted butter, melted

Batter:

- 2½ cups all purpose flour
- 1 ½ cups white sugar
- 1 tablespoon baking powder
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 2 cups milk
- ¼ cup unsalted butter, melted
- 1 tablespoon vanilla extract

Directions

- 1 Gather the ingredients.
- 2 Preheat the oven to 350 degrees F (175 degrees C). Lightly grease a 9x13-inch baking dish.
- 3 Prepare the berries: Whisk sugar and cornstarch together in a small bowl. Place blackberries into a mixing bowl and drizzle with melted butter. Sprinkle cornstarch mixture over top, then toss until evenly coated.
- 4 Spread into the prepared baking dish.
- 5 Make the batter: Whisk flour, sugar, baking powder, and salt together in a mixing bowl until evenly blended. Stir in milk, melted butter, and vanilla until combined but still slightly lumpy.
- 6 Pour over berries in the baking dish.
- 7 Bake in the preheated oven until berries are tender and the crust is golden brown, 55 to 60 minutes.

Our sixth feature is The Closetorium Fashion Library, located at 5 Sweeten Creek Rd, Asheville, NC 28803.

Q: How does a Fashion Library work?

A: The Closetorium is a fashion library on a mission to provide real tangible solutions to our textile waste problem & our over-consumption of cheap clothes made by fast fashion. The Closetorium acts like a library, except instead of withdrawing books, you withdraw a new wardrobe! Members join & gain access to THE BIGGEST CLOSET ON EARTH! By offering clothing in a swapping model, we are able to extend garment lifespan, provide endless luxury, save money on clothes & most importantly, keep textile waste out of the landfill.



Q: What is the origin story of The Closetorium?

A: The Netflix documentary "Buy Now" shines a spotlight on overconsumption through excessive production of cheap products. Fast Fashion industries are mass producing low quality clothes for us to buy, throw away & buy again.

I thought to myself, if we could just share instead of buying new, we could fix this broken system.

Q: What range of items do you offer and how do you source them?

A: We are working to curate a diverse array of options for all

styles, sizes & genders but it takes working together to get there! Our wardrobe is 100% community donated. We hope to emphasize natural materials, & discourage toxic petroleum based materials which now make up 2/3 of all clothes.

We intend to collaborate with sustainable makers, local businesses & designers who make ethical practices a priority.

Q: How do you recycle unwanted clothes?

A: We encourage up-cycling to avoid sending anymore textile waste to the landfill & have 2 sewing machines ready for members to get creative! We have a whole section of "Tailoring approved" articles & hope to host workshops focused on sewing & sustainability. The Closetorium isn't just a fashion library, it's a revolution! A sustainability sanctuary with fashion focused flare! At The Closetorium, the energy is "getting ready with friends", interwoven with environmental justice.


